### Raynham Estate Drop-In Session

Thank you to all who attended our drop-in session on  $11^{th}$  February. We were heartened to see so many of you turn out to find out more about plans across the estate and to share your thoughts and feedback with us on the day and since.

The first phase of our Parkland Restoration Project is now almost complete with over 150 acres of land reverting back to parkland and nearly 4,500 native trees planted to reinstate the historic parkland setting.

We are now moving on to the next phase, which is the dredging of the lake. This part of the project will see bunds and weirs created over the coming weeks which will collect the dredged silt once that part of the works can commence. The final phase later in the year will then be further works to the lake edge to help restore what is one of Norfolk's oldest hand-built lakes.

We have also taken on board your comments about the footpath at Larder Canal and we have added this to our team works schedule to improve the area which has been suffering with water logging at times.

It is our intention to hold further drop-in sessions in the coming months so that we can give you updates on current projects.

### Kestrel Evaluation Squadron

In 1964 RAF West Raynham was to play a crucial role in the development of a revolutionary new aircraft; as fast and manoeuvrable as a fighter, but capable of vertical take-off and landing, just like a helicopter. The Kestrel was so revolutionary that a special squadron was formed to assess its suitability for field operations.

The Tripartite Evaluation Squadron (TES) was an international project, the first of its kind in the world. Under their British Commanding Officer, Wing Commander D. McLagan Scrimgeour, British, German and American military pilots and ground crew worked together to evaluate the aircraft's performance under a variety of conditions.



The experimental single seat transonic aircraft was a forerunner of the Harrier vertical and short take-off and landing (V/STOL) jet fighter bomber. It was designed to operate in the high-speed, low level tactical strike reconnaissance role. One of the most advanced military aircraft in the world, the Kestrel needed no airfield but could operate from a patch of unprepared ground making it extremely versatile.

The team used West Raynham as a base for the evaluation, but also two nearby abandoned airfields at Bircham and North Pickenham as semi-prepared sites, and Buckenham Tofts as an unprepared site for landings with the minimum of ancillary equipment. Nine Kestrel FGA.1 aircraft were ordered for the project, but one was lost on the day that flying began. One of the pilots crashed on take-off and Scrimgeour and two others received the Queen's Commendation for Brave Conduct for their part in rescuing him from the burning aircraft.

One of the Deputy Commanders, heading Germany's six-man contingent, was the war-time flying ace Gerhard 'Gerd' Barkhorn. Barkhorn was the first pilot to fly 1,000 combat sorties and was credited with 301 victories on the Eastern Front against the Soviet Red Air Force,

making him the second most successful pilot of all time, after Erich Hartmann. He was shot down nine times in his combat career, bailed out once and wounded twice. He eventually surrendered to the Western Allies in May 1945 and was kept a prisoner of war until his release in September.

Barkhorn was invited to join the new German Air Force, or Bundesluftwaffe, in 1955 and was among a group of pilots sent to England to be trained by the RAF. Returning to Germany, he commanded the 31 Fighter Bomber Wing before joining the staff of the Air Force Test Command and coming to West Raynham.

During one mission, Barkhorn crash-landed at RAF West Raynham, when he apparently cut thrust one metre above the ground, wiping out the undercarriage. Known for his dry humour, Barkhorn is said to have commented, as he was helped out of the wreckage: "Drei hundert und zwei". With 301 'kills' claimed during WW2 he had, 20 years later, finally claimed his 302<sup>nd</sup>.



RAF West Raynham played host in October 1965 to a number of high-ranking government and military representatives of countries interested in the new aircraft. The RAF ordered six pre-production P.1127 (RAF) aircraft that year, and in early 1967 Hawker Aviation received an order for a further 60, by then formally designated the Harrier GR.1.

Harriers have served in the Royal Air Force and in the Royal Navy, being ideally suited to operating from aircraft carriers, as well as other foreign air forces — primarily the US Marine Corps. They played an important role in the Falklands and Gulf Wars and more recently in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Practical 'hands on' volunteers are important for the maintenance and management on the reserve. Their hard work includes helping build walkways, bird hides, scrub clearance and repairs. Volunteers also make bird boxes for the Hawk and Owl Trust Adopt-a-Box scheme.

Volunteer wardens are a vital link in explaining what is going on in the reserve to the public. Wardens and other volunteers help with regular wildlife surveys covering birds, butterflies and dragonflies and damselflies.

### West Raynham Nature Notes - February 2023

I thought February was quite a good month, with plenty of birdlife coming to the garden feeders, frogs starting to get very active in our pond and I saw my first butterfly of the year – a comma along the riverbank one sunny morning.

Out and about I was pleased to see a stoat dart across the path in front of me in the marshy woodland north of the lake. Stoats are probably quite common here but only rarely glimpsed. Another mammal, the Chinese water deer, is becoming more frequent - or at least I am seeing them more often and in several different places. My latest sighting was in a field on the Hardlands. Despite their name, these non-native deer do stray some distance from wet habitats; you could expect to see them anywhere around here, along with the ever-present muntjac and roe deer. We have been seeing all three species in the same field in late afternoon, just as it's getting dark.

Bird-wise there's been little of special note to report, although a very late group of pink-footed geese were heard passing over on the last day of the month. Most of the wintering pink-feet in Norfolk - of which there are tens of thousands, have already left on their journey back to Iceland.

### Desilting works at Raynham Lake

I expect most people will have noticed the earth works going on in the big field on the north side of the village – or you may have seen the plans during the drop-in session that the Raynham Estate hosted in the Village Hall on 11<sup>th</sup> February. These works look quite dramatic, but they are forming temporary bunded lagoons into which silt and sludge will be pumped from the lake as the desilting operation gets going later this spring.

Obviously, at one level this will be quite disruptive for wildlife but the lake has been neglected for many years and has become overgrown and so silted up it is too shallow. By opening up some of the fringing vegetation and creating a deeper water body, we can expect a wider variety of wildfowl and other wildlife to recolonise once the works are completed.

I am curious to see whether the temporary lagoons will attract interesting passage migrants during the spring and autumn, or just be dead, stagnant pools and dark, baked sludge as the summer progresses. I hope the former, but we will see. At least the current earthworks are providing a huge feast for numerous black-headed and common gulls, that can be seen flocking behind the bulldozers.

One other surprise: I discovered a pair of grey herons have made a nest high up in an alder on the east side of the lake, which is the first time herons have nested here in recent years, at least as far as I am aware. They are typically early season breeders, so I hope they can raise their brood before the lake works are too far advanced.

### Saving frogs and toads

In the coming weeks, when we get mild, wet evenings, we can expect many frogs and toads to be on the move. Unfortunately, many get squashed on the roads. If any of you have a spare moment on such evenings, it would be great if you could pop out with a torch and search the street near your home and pick up any amphibians you find that are heading into harm's way.

Anywhere along The Street from the bottom of Hollow Lane to the other end of the village is a good place to look. I have also in the past found quite a few squashed specimens near the road bridge over the river at the bottom on the lime avenue.

One challenge can be knowing which way the animals are going. It would be galling to help them back across the road that they have already crossed once, so if in doubt as to which whey they look like they are heading, take a moment to watch them before diving in. Of course, if cars are approaching, you may need to intervene quickly.
