

The Raynhams' Gardening Club

The Gardening Club has discussed a programme for purchasing and planting bulbs throughout the village, based on the money raised with the help of so many people in the village, from the Open Gardens event in June.

We have decided to start with the Wild Daffodil, Narcissus pseudonarcissus. These are the original wild daffodils that grew everywhere in the British Isles once, but in quantity they are now confined to small areas. Bringing the wild daffodil to West Raynham will be an exciting thing to do. Unlike the daffodils we typically grow in our gardens it is guite small with a height of 25cm or 8 inches. It flowers early in March and into April depending on the weather. Being this size it will put up with the winds and rain of Spring very well. So, to make an impression you need to plant *en masse*, and this is what we intend to do, planting 2,000 or more bulbs around the village.



We have been given permission from Raynham Estate to plant on the green by the Methodist Chapel. We also want to plant in two other areas, the triangular green area at the junction of The Drove and Hollow Lane, and the corner at the entrance to the village from Helhoughton (not disturbing the bee orchids), by the children's playground.

Wild daffodil bulbs are relatively small so will take time to establish themselves and flower. I'm very hopeful we will get some flowers in the first year, but they will take time



to reach their peak and fully naturalise in their new setting. Another difference to our garden daffodils, which are hybrids and don't seed around, is that wild daffodils do produce seed and, if left to

naturalise will spread further and further, gradually increasing their numbers over the years. New seedlings take a few years to start flowering but will be worth the wait.

So, with lots of bulbs to plant, the Gardening Club would welcome offers of help to join in with planting, and we have set aside some weekends to do this, which are:

- Saturday 26th October
- Sunday 3rd November
- Sunday 27th October
- Saturday 2nd November
- Saturday 9th November •
- Sunday 10th November •

We will start on the Village Green at 10am on Saturday 26th, and once this area is planted, we will move to the next location.

We haven't planted this number of bulbs before so have no idea how quickly we will get this done and the earlier dates are when we could particularly do with help. Obviously, we are subject to the vagaries of the weather so we may have to cancel dates at short notice if it's going to pour with rain!

The bulbs can be planted with a sharp trowel or possibly even a dibber if you are able to bring one. If you can help, then please send an email with the dates you are available and the number of people you may be able to bring with you to: <u>westray.newsletter@gmail.com</u>.

The Plant Stall in West Raynham

There is a wide variety of plants still available on the plant stall. Autumn is a good time to plant as the soil is still warm after the summer. Here are three plants on the stall suitable for winter, mid-summer and late summer into autumn flowering.

First is a small shrub, *Sarcococca hookeriana*, known as the 'Himalayan Sweet Box' that is very hardy. It is an evergreen plant that produces sweet smelling flowers in January and February. So, as we don't go out into the gardens much at that time of year, it is suggested that you plant it in a sunny spot perhaps by your front door or a gateway, so you get the benefit every time you pass by. I have it growing by my gate and on warmer days its scent takes you by surprise. Pick a few sprigs and bring them into the house so you get the scent inside too. Only a few plants remaining.





The second plant is *Eryngium planum*, a member of the sea holly family that comes from south-east Europe and central Asia. People are always asking if I have this variety for sale when they see it growing by the stall, but I don't usually have them. So back in the spring I saw a packet of seeds of this variety and bought them. The instructions were dire! Do this, if it doesn't work do this, and if that doesn't work do this! After that, give up! So, I didn't expect much luck, but virtually all the seeds germinated, and I potted up 59 plants! Quite a few have gone but I still have a lot left to sell. They are a branched small blue thistle like flower and the stems at

the top are also blue, which is very striking. They are tough plants, grow in many situations and flower mid-summer. At the end of the summer, you can cut them down and they make great dry flower arrangements.

The third plant is a fuchsia from the deep south of South America, *Fuchsia magellanica*, sometimes known as the 'Hummingbird fuchsia'. It is most commonly in red but there is a 'white' version, which is actually a really pale pink. It is a small shrub that loses its leaves during winter unless it is very mild. The white version grows more quickly than the red version of the plant but is easily trimmed to the size that you want. It starts flowering in summer and, if mild, flowers into autumn. I only have a few pots of this plant remaining.



Remember all the proceeds from the stall go to Guide Dogs.
